Internal Evaluation will be based on two sessional examinations –

(i) Home assignments (ii) Seminars (iii) Library works, etc.

* External Evaluation will be through a final examination at the end of the semester.

- The pass marks in each theory paper is 30% and that in each practical paper is 40%.
- In each paper, students must secure pass marks in both the Internal as well as External Evaluations separately.
- A student who could not appear or failed in any semester examination will be allowed to clear the same as follows:
- (a) First Semester with the regular third Semester examination.
- (b) Second Semester with the regular fourth semester examination.
- (c) Third Semester with the regular fifth Semester examination.
- (d) Fourth Semester with the regular Sixth Semester examination.
- A student may be allowed to 'Repeat' any one of the theory papers in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Semester and may be allowed for 'betterment' of marks in one paper in the fift Semester, provided the student secure less than 45% marks in that particular paper.
- No 'Repeat' or 'Betterment' shall be allowed in the practical examinations in any Semester.
- A student must pass all his Semester examination, including 'Repeat' and 'Betterment' chances within five years from the date of admission to the first semester course. A student will get a maximum of three chances to clear a particular Semester.
- Since the Semester involves continuous assessment there will be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any subject.

SYLLABUS FOR M.A. PROGRAMME IN ASSAMESE

General Introduction

1. (a) The Master of Arts (M.A.) Programme in Assamese of Gauhati University will be covered in 4 (four) Semesters:

The 1st and the 3rd Semesters will be from January to June.

The 2nd and the 4th Semesters will be from July to December.

(b) Every Semester will have approximately 100 working days (after leaving out Sundays, vacations and holidays) and 250 working hours (taking into account class cancellation and half holidays).

(c) Each course and internal assessment will get 60 academic hours at the minimum.

- 2. (a) The total marks for the programme will be 1600 of which 80% (= 1280) will be external and 20% (= 320) will be internal)
 - (b) Every Semester will have 5 'Course' (previously call 'papers'). Each course will be of 80 marks. 80% (=64) of the total marks for the course will be external and 20% (=16) of the total marks for the course will be internal. This means, each question paper in an examination will be of 64 marks. The remaining 16 marks will be calculated internally.

However, the internal assessment for each course will be related to the content of the course.

- (c) All courses except 3-04, 3-05, 4-02, 4-03, 4-04 and 4-05 are common for all students. Courses 3-04, 3-05, 4-02, 4-03, 4-04 and 4-05 are optional. Students will have to study either 3-04A, 3-05A, 4-02A, 4-03A, 4-04A and 4-05A or 3-04B, 3-05B, 4-02B, 4-03B, 4-04B and 4-05B. Those who study the first group mentioned above will be considered as having 'Specialization in Assamese Literature' (or 'Specialization in Group-A'). In the same way, the students who study the second group mentioned above will be considered as having 'Specialization in Assamese Language' (or 'Specialization in Gruop-B')
- (d) Each course in the present syllabus indicates only the external marks (i.e., 64 marks, referred to as 'Full Marks' far as the external examination is concerned).
- (e) Credit point for each course will be 8 (eight).
- (f) The Internal Assessment marks for each course will be calculated as shown below.

POST GRADUATE COURSE EVALUATION UNDER THE SEMESTER SYSTEM

- 1. A Post Graduate Course shall be of four Semesters covering two Calendar Years. The schedule for the semester system shall be as per the Academic Calendar.
- 2. Students' performance is monitored throughout the Semester by continuous assessment in theory and practical courses. Evaluation of the students' performance in each of the theory and practical paper will be based on the following:

Internal Evaluation: 20% Marks
External Evaluation: 80% Marks

- 3. Internal evaluation shall be based on two sessional examinations, home assignments, seminar and library work in each Semester.
- 4. External evaluation shall be through a final examination at the end of the Semester.
- 5. The pass marks in each theory paper is 30% and that in each practical paper is 40%. However, in order to clear a Semester the student must get a combined aggregate of 45% marks in the subject in each Semester examination. Students have to clear the back in one paper per Semester.
- 6. In each paper, students must secure pass marks in both the internal as well as external evaluation separately.
- 7. A student who could not appear or failed in any Semester examination will be allowed to clear the same as follows:
 - a. First Semester with the regular Third Semester examination.
 - b. Second Semester with the regular Fourth Semester examination.
- 8. A student may be allowed to repeat any one of the theory papers in the First and Second Semester, and may be allowed for 'betterment' of marks in one paper in the Third Semester, provided the student secures less than 55% marks in that paper.
- 9. In the Fourth Semester if a project work or dissertation is evaluated and found to be satisfactory the student need not 'repeat' the project work or dissertation even if he/she fails in the Fourth Semester examination. In order to clear the semester he/she need only to reappear in the theory paper in the next chance.
- 10. A student who has not cleared any semester examination and also for students who have opted for 'repeat'/'betterment' the Fourth Semester results will be withheld until all the back logs are cleared.
- 11. A student must pass all his Semester examinations, including 'repeat' and 'betterment' chances, within four years from the date of admission to the First Semester course. A student will get a maximum of three chances to clear a particular semester.
- 12. In case of any dispute regarding evaluation or unforeseen events the matter may be placed in the Departmental Advisory Committee and Committee of courses and studies P.G.) for an amicable settlement.
- 13. Since the Semester System involves continuous assessment, there will be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any subject.

- 14. Under the present regulations for the Semester System, examination reforms are explicitly introduced. In order to implement these more effectively, the Departments are given academic and financial autonomy. Complete academic freedom is envisaged for the faculty members of each Department.
- 15. For any matter not covered under this regulation for Semester System, the existing University rule and the Gauhati University Act 1949 (as amended till date) shall be applicable.
